INTRODUCTION

With the move of The London International Horse Show (LIHS) to a new venue at the London ExCel in 2021, the opportunity arose to form the 'London Arena' at this larger venue. HPower, organisers of LIHS, alongside its showing partners, the BSHA (British Show Horse Association), the BSPS (British Show Pony Society), and the ASAO (Association of Show and Agricultural Organisations), formed the 'London Committee' to oversee and legislate the new showing series' which were to be launched in the London Arena in 2023.

With these new series' and in supporting County and Agricultural Shows, the LIHS offered local equine competitors the opportunity to compete at their local County show and enjoy a day out, with a goal to aim for, with the hope to encourage new faces into showing. The BSHA Rising Star Supreme Finals gave new competitors into showing and existing BSHA amateur members, another major Championship route to follow during the showing season.

These Rising Star classes were set up as 'type' sections, so those new to showing and unsure of 'type' could gain help in the ring, at clinics and be guided into the correct section for their horse. The aim was always to support and offer help and guidance to all competitors.

The Rising Stars series was to be kept very simply, amateur based. The inaugural Finals at the London International Horse Show were a huge success in 2023, where 90% of the entrants were new to the sport.

The BSHA appointed volunteers from within the industry who were able to provide training clinics, they were present during the Finals, and during each class for all competitors, to offer reassurance and assistance. This was greatly appreciated by many competitors in 2023 and will continue in 2024.

The Rising Star series now has its own rulebook, separate to the BSHA main rulebook. We ask for all competitors to take time to read the rules and guidance within the Rising Star Rulebook before competing in this series.

RISING STAR RULES 2024

This series has been established for amateur and grassroots riders who do not show or compete on a professional (remunerated) level in equestrian disciplines, so please be aware that the rules for this series **do differ** from the Amateur rules for other longstanding series which are in the main BSHA Rulebook. Please ensure you read the rules below carefully.

ELIGIBILITY FOR THE CLASS

No Rider or Owner who falls within the following criteria may compete on or enter an animal in Rising Star classes IF THEY:

- Receive financial remuneration or other rewards, produces(ed), teaches, rides or schools **SHOW** riders or horses or ponies for the **SHOW** ring. These rules relate solely to **SHOWING**, those involved in other equestrian disciplines remain eligible, including equestrian retailers, riding school and livery owners or employed staff, those who break and school for other disciplines, unless remuneration is received for professional training or riding services at an affiliated equine level (BD, BS, BE).
- No rider may qualify more than one animal in each section.
- Appear on any showing judges panel for affiliated show organisations, or societies.
- Are a Professionally Produced Amateur (horse stabled in livery with a Showing Professional).
- Appear on any social media sites, any electronic sites or publications as a promotional 'Brand Ambassador' for a company, or receive benefits whether monetary or 'gifted'.
- Have previously been **CHAMPION** in any LIHS BSHA Rising Star Supreme Finals at the London ExCel.

OPEN TO:

- Horses which have never been placed in the top 9 in any class at Horse of the Year Show Finals (not including SFAS or SEIB R2R Final).
- Riders not to have competed in any classes at Horse of the Year Show in the two previous seasons (2022 & 2023) (not including SFAS or SEIB R2R Final).
- Riders not to have been placed in the top 9 in any classes at Horse of the Year Show Finals in the current season (2024).
- Horses which have not been placed in the top 5 in any OPEN class at the Royal International Horse show (this excludes the current season).

RISING STAR RULES 2024

GENERAL RULES:

- Competitors do not have to be members to compete in the direct qualifiers, however all competitors who receive their qualification to the LIHS BSHA Rising Star Supreme Final must complete their membership and registration with the BSHA within 14 days for their qualification to stand or this will pass down to the next eligible exhibit.
- No Competitor previously deemed a showing Professional or Producer may be permitted to enter these classes.
- No Judges from any affiliated Associations or Societies may act as part of a 'support team' and enter the ring to 'groom' for any competitor or offer verbal ringside assistance at the Finals.
- Any competitor who has previously been disqualified from the series will not be allowed to compete within the series again.
- Riders should be suitably mounted at all times, this includes appropriate use of tack, spurs and whips whilst part of any qualifying process or part of the Final.
- Horses must be worked in by the Rider that will compete on the Horse in the Competition.
- The BSHA shall publish a list of all qualified riders and horses on their website throughout the season, which will be available on the BSHA website (www.britishshowhorse.org). All complaints regarding eligibility for the Series must be received by Friday 18th October 2024 from Members only. After this date **NO OTHER COMPLAINTS WILL BE ACCEPTED BY THE ASSOCIATION OR ANY PARTNERS OF THE LONDON INTERNATIONAL HORSE SHOW.**
- All horses competing at the Final **MUST BE FULLY VACCINATED** to fit rules and regulations of the London International Horse Show without exception.
- The BSHA Office will only enter into correspondence relating to qualification, with those who are both Rising Star finalists and BSHA members.
- Transfer of qualification of Horse is allowed as long as the new owner and or rider fulfills the eligibility for the class.
- JMB certificates will not be required to compete in these classes.
- No Stallions are eligible to take part in any Rising Star classes.
- No rider under 15 years of age is eligible to compete in classes Affiliated to the Association. Proof of age may be required.
- The Judge will NOT ride exhibits in these classes.
- The Judges decision is final.

Classes that qualify for BSHA Rising Star Supreme Finals at the London International Horse Show will allow the highest placed unqualified horse in top 5 to qualify. If classes are amalgamated each highest unqualified horse of each section will qualify.

DIRECT QUALIFIERS FOR THE LIHS - CLASS DEFINITIONS

Rising Star Hack

Hack type: Mare or gelding, 4 years old and over, exceeding 148cms, but not exceeding 160cms. The highest unqualified horse placed in the top 5 will qualify for the LIHS BSHA Rising Star Hack Supreme Final at the LIHS in December.

In addition, the two highest unqualified placed horses will qualify for the Rising Star Associate finals at the BSHA National Championships Show in September.

Rising Star Riding Horse

Small Riding Horse type: Mare or gelding, 4 years old and over, exceeding 148cms and not exceeding 158cms. The highest unqualified horse placed in the top 5 will qualify for the LIHS BSHA Rising Star Supreme Small Riding Horse Supreme Final at the LIHS in December.

In addition, the two highest unqualified placed horses will qualify for the Rising Star Associate finals at the BSHA National Championships Show in September.

Large Riding Horse type: Mare or gelding, 4 years old and over, exceeding 158cms. The highest unqualified horse placed in the top 5 will qualify for the LIHS BSHA Rising Star Large Riding Horse Supreme Final at the LIHS in December.

In addition, the two highest unqualified placed horses will qualify for the Rising Star Associate finals at the BSHA National Championships Show in September.

Rising Star Cob

Lightweight Cob type: Mare or gelding, 4 years old and over, exceeding 148cms, but not exceeding 155cms, capable of carrying up to 14 stone. The highest unqualified horse placed in the top 5 will qualify for the LIHS BSHA Rising Star Lightweight Cob Supreme Final at the LIHS in December.

In addition, the two highest unqualified placed horses will qualify for the Rising Star Associate finals at the BSHA National Championships Show in September.

Heavyweight Cob type: Mare or gelding, 4 years old and over, exceeding 148cms, but not exceeding 155cms, capable of carrying more than 14 stone. The highest unqualified horse placed in the top 5 will qualify for the LIHS BSHA Rising Star Heavyweight Cob Supreme Final at the LIHS in December.

In addition, the two highest unqualified placed horses will qualify for the Rising Star Associate finals at the BSHA National Championships Show in September.

Maxi Cob type: Mare or gelding, 4 years old and over, exceeding 155cms - to be judged as Cobs. Judges must pay particular attention to type (i.e. short legged animals of COB type). To be shown hogged. The highest unqualified horse placed in the top 5 will qualify for the LIHS BSHA Rising Star Maxi Cob Supreme Final at the LIHS in December.

In addition, the two highest unqualified placed horses will qualify for the Rising Star Associate finals at the BSHA National Championships Show in September.

DIRECT QUALIFIERS FOR THE LIHS - CLASS DEFINITIONS

Rising Star Ridden Hunter

Small/Lightweight Hunter type: Mare or gelding, 4 years old or over exceeding 158cms, (small hunter not to exceed 158cms). Capable of carrying up to 79.5kgs (12 stone 7lbs). The highest unqualified horse placed in the top 5 will qualify for the LIHS BSHA Rising Star Small/Lightweight Hunter Supreme Final at the LIHS in December.

In addition, the two highest unqualified placed horses will qualify for the Rising Star Associate finals at the BSHA National Championships Show in September.

Middleweight/Heavyweight Hunter type: Mare or gelding, 4 years old or over, exceeding 158cms. Capable of carrying over 89kgs (14 stone). The highest unqualified horse placed in the top 5 will qualify for the LIHS BSHA Rising Star Middleweight/Heavyweight Hunter Supreme Final at the LIHS in December.

In addition, the two highest unqualified placed horses will qualify for the Rising Star Associate finals at the BSHA National Championships Show in September.

Rising Star Ladies Show Horse: Mare or gelding, 4 years old or over, exceeding 148cms, suitable to carry a side saddle, to be ridden by a lady. Open to all Hacks, Cobs, Riding Horses and Hunters. The highest unqualified horse placed in the top 5 will qualify for the LIHS BSHA Rising Star Ladies Show Horse Supreme Final at the LIHS in December.

Rising Star Working Show Horse: Open ONLY to Hacks, Cobs, Maxi Cobs and Riding Horses, mare or gelding, 4 years old and over, exceeding 148cms. Any horse which is Grade B showjumper, Intermediate Eventer, or above as at 1st January of the current year, is not eligible.

Height of fences: minimum 2'6", maximum 2'9", maximum spread 2'9". Please note the height of the fences may be raised at the final at the discretion of the Course builder/ BSHA Representative.

The highest unqualified horse placed in the top 5 will qualify for the LIHS BSHA Rising Star Working Show Horse Supreme Final at the LIHS in December.

Rising Star of Working Hunter: Open ONLY to Hunters, mare or gelding, 4 years old and over exceeding 148cm (14.2hh approx.) Any horse which is registered / previously registered as a Grade A showjumper, Advanced Eventer, or above as at 1st January of the current year, is not eligible.

Height of fences: minimum 3'0", maximum 3'3", maximum spread 3'3". Please note the height of the fences may be raised at the final at the discretion of the Course builder/ BSHA Representative.

The highest unqualified horse placed in the top 5 will qualify for the LIHS BSHA Rising Star Working Hunter Type Supreme Final at the LIHS in December

DIRECT QUALIFIERS FOR THE LIHS - CLASS DEFINITIONS

Rising Star Racehorse to Show Horse: Mare or gelding, 4 years old or over, exceeding 148cm. Open to thoroughbred horses or Arab horses retired from race training. The highest unqualified horse placed in the top 5 will qualify for the LIHS BSHA Rising Star Racehorse to Show Horse Supreme Final at the LIHS in December. This class is open to competitors who work within the racing industry.

In addition, the two highest unqualified placed horses will qualify for the Rising Star Associate finals at the BSHA National Championships Show in September.

WILDCARD QUALIFICATION

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A results points table will run for all qualifying classes and a 'wild card' will be awarded to those unqualified horses with the highest points in each section. To ensure this all shows will be asked to provide their results in full, the BSHA will not be responsible for any show that fails to provide full admin results to the BSHA office.

The points table will work as follows and will only include those horses from the top 5 from each set of results, even if the class is amalgamated:

1st Place	5 points
2nd Place	4 points
3rd Place	3 points
4th Place	2 points
5th Place	1 point

In the case of equality of points, the competitor with the higher placings throughout the season will be given the qualification. If there is still an equality, both competitors will qualify.

CHANGE OF SECTION OR TYPE

If you have qualified for a class and are subsequently advised by the Judge, that your horse is more suited to another section within the type (ie lightweight cob into heavyweight cob) and/or if you are advised the same by a BSHA Accredited Trainer, please contact the BSHA Office to discuss transfer of section for the Final at risingstar@britishshowhorse.org. No qualifications can be transferred from one class type to another (ie moving a qualification from a riding horse type class into a hunter type class will not be permitted).

CHAMPION OF CHAMPIONS

At the BSHA National Championship Show in September there will be a 'Champion of Champions' evening performance final of the previous season's London International Horse Show Rising Star Supreme final winners. Invitations will be emailed by the BSHA office when entries open for the BSHA National Championship Show.

RISING STAR ASSOCIATE CLASSES

Classes will qualify for the BSHA Rising Star Associate Series Final at the BSHA National Championships Show. The two highest unqualified horses in the qualifying class will be eligible to compete in the BSHA Rising Star Associate Final at the BSHA National Championships Show.

The Judge will NOT ride exhibits in these classes.

Rising Star Ridden Hack/Riding Horse type: Mare or gelding, 4 years old and over, exceeding 148cms. The two highest unqualified horses will qualify for the Rising Star Associate Series Final at the BSHA National Championships Show September 2024.

Rising Star Ridden Show Hunter type: Mare or gelding, 4 years old and over, exceeding 148cms. The two highest unqualified horses will qualify for the Rising Star Associate Series Final at the BSHA National Championships Show September 2024.

Rising Star Ridden Show Cob type: Mare or gelding, 4 years old and over, exceeding 148cms. Exhibits to be shown hogged. The two highest unqualified horses will qualify for the Rising Star Associate Series Final at the BSHA National Championships Show September 2024.

Rising Star Racehorse to Show Horse: Mare or gelding, 4 years old or over, exceeding 148cms. Open to Thoroughbred & Arab horses retired from race training. The two highest unqualified horses will qualify for the Rising Star Associate Series Final at the BSHA National Championships Show September 2024. This class is open to competitors who work within the racing industry.

BSHA IN-HAND RISING STAR ASSOCIATE SERIES CLASSES

Classes will qualify for the BSHA In-Hand Rising Star Associate Series Final at the BSHA National Championships Show, September 2024. The two highest unqualified horses.

In-Hand Rising Star Hack/Riding Horse type: Mare or gelding, 4 years old and over, exceeding 148cms. The two highest unqualified horses will qualify for the final at the BSHA National Championships Show September 2024.

In-Hand Rising Star Cob type: Mare or gelding, 4 years old and over, exceeding 148cms. Exhibits to be shown hogged. The two highest unqualified horses will qualify for the final at the BSHA National Championships Show September 2024.

In-Hand Rising Star Hunter type: Mare or gelding, 4 years old and over, exceeding 148cms. The two highest unqualified horses will qualify for the final at the BSHA National Championships Show September 2024.

In-Hand Rising Star Racehorse to Show Horse: are or gelding, 4 years old or over, exceeding 148cms. Open to Thoroughbred and Arab horses retired from race training. The two highest unqualified horses will qualify for the final at the BSHA National Championships Show September 2024. This class is open to competitors who work within the racing industry.

QUALIFICATION COMMUNICATION

QUALIFICATION CARDS

A qualification card will be presented in the ring detailing how to confirm qualification and register with the BSHA. All finalists should be made aware that to enter the Supreme Final at the LIHS, they should be members of the BSHA and be conversant with the Rising Star rules. This must be completed within 14 days.

BSHA RISING STAR LONDON INTERNATIONAL FACEBOOK GROUP

The BSHA moderates a group on the social media platform, Facebook. Moderators of the BSHA will approve each person into the group. The BSHA asks that you treat all members in the group with respect at all times. We will remove any member who behaves inappropriately. While we accept group members can raise any questions or concerns, we ask this is done in a respectful manner at all times.

ONLINE ENTRIES FOR THE LONDON INTERNATIONAL HORSE SHOW FINAL

All entries will be taken through Entrymaster directly with the BSHA. All eligible entrants will be contacted directly by email, please ensure your details are correct when completing your membership. Entries will open in October 2024.

COMPETING AS AN AMATEUR WITH THE BSHA

To compete in any BSHA mainstream classes, National Championship qualifiers, RIHS and HOYS you MUST fit within the parameters of the main BSHA rulebook if you wish to compete as an Amateur rider. Please see website for more details. The Rising Star rules are showing specific and so we ask you to take into consideration the changes for the Amateur status for non-Rising Star classes in the BSHA Main Rulebook.

CLINICS

All those entered into the Rising Star Finals are not permitted to attend any clinics held by a LIHS BSHA Rising Star Final Judge for their section final in the current season.

REFUNDS

REFUNDS FOR FINALS

If an Entrant withdraws their entry they will not be entitled to a refund of any Entry Fee directly from the BSHA after the close of entries. All applications for refunds must be sent to HPower directly.

In the event that a Final is cancelled the entrant may be refunded (less any administration charges), but any such refund shall be at the sole discretion of HPower.

COMPLAINTS PROCEDURE

COMPLAINTS PROCEDURE

If you wish to contact the BSHA to make a complaint regarding a direct qualification awarded at a show (not the Final) this must be done in writing within 21 days of the qualifying show. The complaint must be sent directly with name and address supplied by a competing BSHA member or competing Rising Star entrant along with payment of £100 to be received by the BSHA office to risingstar@britishshowhorse.org. The resulting BSHA Board decision alongside any partners of the London International Horse Show, relating to any complaints will be final.

The BSHA shall publish a list of all riders and horses entered in the LIHS BSHA Rising Star Supreme Finals, on their website available for public view. All complaints regarding eligibility of entrants for the series final must be received by Friday 18th October 2024. After this date no other complaints regarding eligibility will be accepted or supported by the Association or any partners. The complaint must be sent directly with name and address supplied by a competing BSHA member or competing Rising Star entrant along with payment of £100 to be received by the BSHA office. The resulting BSHA Board decision alongside any partners of the London International Horse Show, relating to any complaints will be final.

Any complaints not regarding eligibility arising from the series Finals must be made within 14 days of the date of the class in question. The complaint must be sent directly with name and address supplied by a competing BSHA member or competing Rising Star entrant along with payment of £100 to be received by the BSHA office. The resulting BSHA Board decision alongside any partners of the London International Horse Show, relating to any complaints will be final.

All upheld complaints will be refunded the payment of £100 from the BSHA office.

PLEASE NOTE: A COMMENT ON SOCIAL MEDIA OR PRIVATE MESSAGE DOES NOT CONSTITUTE AN OFFICIAL COMPLAINT

RESPONSIBLE USE OF SOCIAL MEDIA/PUBLICATIONS

Every member must be respectful of each other, the BSHA and all partners involved in London International Horse Show and should exercise good judgement when posting on social media, including consideration of the potential consequences of their interactions on any social media platforms or any publications.

- Please do not engage in online discussions, arguments, private user chats or forums that target a particular group or single out an individual for specific criticism / comment which may bring the BSHA or any of its partners into disrepute.
- Please do not share or use on social media any personal or contact information of another BSHA member without gaining permission of that member. This includes displaying any correspondence to or from the BSHA or any of its partners at any time.
- Only post comments that you would publicly say - often comments can appear unsportsmanlike so think before you click!

RESPONSIBLE USE OF SOCIAL MEDIA/PUBLICATIONS

- The BSHA reserves the right to instruct the removal of any comments which are deemed to be in breach of this policy.
- Please remember the Rising Stars series is run under the ethos of inclusion, helpfulness, guidance and encouragement at all times.
- **Any breaches of Responsible Use of Social Media/Publications will result in disqualification from the Final and any subsequent Membership with the Association.**
- The Association will from time to time use images from BSHA classes for use on their website, social media and any BSHA publications. You may ask for your image to be removed from publication by application to the office.

QUESTIONS ASKED...

- Will I need to prepare my horse for a ride judge?
No, there will be no ride judges for any qualifiers, if a judge asks to ride your horse at a show, speak to the steward and remind them there is no ride judge permitted.
- Will I need to perform a set show?
No, there is no set show for these classes. You will be expected to show walk, trot, canter on both reins and an extension of canter/gallop (but not hacks). The judge will be looking for a well executed show, smooth transitions and a good style of riding. The Judge may ask you to strip the saddle from your horse and run up the horse inhand for them to assess (conformation), this will happen at the Final.
- How do I turn my horse out for the class?
Turning your horse out to 'type' is usual in showing. All show cob classes must have hogged animals with pulled tails for instance. You are not expected to have show tack, simple is usually better, and you can show your horse in a snaffle if you wish. Looking at professional pictures online from County shows will also give a great insight into how your horse should be presented.
- Can I ask for feedback at a qualifier?
Yes, of course you can ask for feedback at any show you attend. Sometimes there is time constraints so do not be offended if the steward is unable to facilitate this for you. We encourage Judges to do this as part of the process of these classes.
- Will there be clinics?
There will be a full list of clinics available for entrants to attend for preparation for the London International Horse Show.
- Will there be Judges feedback at LIHS?
Having our first year now under our belt we will be working hard to enable our competitors to have some feedback during the classes. We also hope to have an area where competitors can speak to Judges after their classes if this facility is available, all entrants will receive more details.

ADVICE FOR TACK & DRESS

- **Working Hunter:** No hind boots or bandages of any description are allowed in the collecting ring, warm up or in the actual class.
- Bitless bridles and running gags are not permitted in any classes. The use of the Swale bit is discouraged in all classes. The bit used should be appropriate to the requirements of the horse. Bits must be used in their manufactured condition without any addition or modification to, or on, any part and conform to the requirements of the Class. The bit must never be used to reprimand the horse. Such use is always excessive and will render the rider liable to disciplinary action. Solid curb chains are not permitted in any ridden or in hand classes.
- Horses may be shown shod or unshod.
- No earrings, piercings or visible jewellery should be worn.
- The BSHA recommends the wearing of an approved Safety Hat at all times, but is up to the individual to decide - however please follow all scheduled rules regarding hat safety at all shows entered.

GUIDELINES FOR DRESS IS TRADITIONAL - VARIATIONS ARE PERMITTED

RIDDEN - COUNTY SHOWS - COBS/HUNTERS

- Bowler hat for gentlemen, navy or black hunting cap for ladies with ribbon tabs inside
- Tweed jackets for ladies and gentlemen with neat collar and tie
- Fawn, cream or buff breeches
- Plain black or brown boots with garter strap fixing if available
- Spurs should be worn by adults at the heel seam of the boot, not hanging off the end of the boot - spurs can be dummies
- Gloves; brown, fawn or tan
- Showing cane

EVENING PERFORMANCE - COBS/HUNTERS

- Top hats or hunting caps for ladies and gentlemen
- Correctly tied hunting stock with pin
- Scarlet or black jacket or tails for gentlemen, navy or black jacket for ladies
- Gentlemen should wear brown topped boots with white garter strap if available, ladies normal black boots
- Spurs should be worn as above
- Gloves as above
- Hunting whip with thong to be carried

COUNTY SHOWS - HACKS

- Bowlers for gentlemen, navy or black hunting cap for ladies with ribbons inside
- Jackets - ladies blue or black jacket with neat collar and tie - gentlemen tweed
- Plain black boots with garter strap fixing if available
- Showing cane
- Buttonholes may be worn

EVENING PERFORMANCE - HACKS

- Top hat for gentlemen and ladies
- Gentlemen should wear morning coats and close fitting military trousers or similar with ordinary collar and tie
- Gloves as above
- Showing cane
- Buttonhole

ADVICE FOR TACK & DRESS

COUNTY SHOWS – RIDING HORSES

- Bowlers for gentlemen, navy or black hunting cap for ladies with ribbons inside
- Ladies and gentlemen tweed jackets
- Everything else as above for cobs
- Showing cane

EVENING PERFORMANCE – RIDING HORSES

- Top hat for gentlemen and ladies
- Correctly tied hunting stock with pin
- Gentlemen black hunting tails, breeches and boots
- Ladies black or navy jacket, breeches and boots
- Showing cane
- Buttonhole

COUNTY SHOWS – SIDE SADDLE – HACKS, COBS, RIDING HORSES AND HUNTERS

- Ordinary habit, blue, black or tweed with collar and tie
- Bowler hat with veil

For classes at Royal or International Shows after 12 noon black or blue habits would be required with correctly tied hunting stock with pin

- Top hat with veil
- In the above classes hair should be in a neat bun at the nape of the neck
- One spur only to be worn
- Showing cane
- Buttonhole

IN-HAND

- Suitable clothing including for gentlemen a suit, collar and tie or jacket and trousers
- Bowler hat
- Ladies tweed jacket and trousers (not jeans), collar and tie or suitable skirts or suits
- With tweed jacket and trousers a hunting cap should be worn
- With skirts or suits a suitable hat securely fitted
- Suitable footwear for walking and running appropriate for underfoot conditions (no trainers or tennis shoes)
- Gloves
- Showing cane
- Buttonhole if wished

GROOMS

When entering the Ring should be neatly attired in:

- Hunting cap, cloth cap, panama or other suitable hat
- Neat collar and tie (pinned)
- Jacket or gilet
- Trousers
- Appropriate footwear (jodhpur boots preferred)

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
